

On August 15th, 2013, ninety-two (92) community residents, speaking ten (10) different languages, gathered at the Atlanta Area School for the Deaf to begin the process of determining a project to fund from the Clarkston Community Trust.

Residents met in small, randomized groups to prioritize the following ten themes utilizing a process of deliberation and numeric (i.e., forced ranking) prioritization:

- Civic Engagement and Justice
- Connectedness
- Education
- Economic Development
- Food Security and Sustainability
- Health
- Housing
- Play and Fitness
- Safety
- Transportation

Residents prioritized themes based on the criteria of need, equity, and local involvement.
The definitions for each of the themes and criteria are provided on the attached Appendix
A. For each criterion, individuals in each group shared with their group their personal priorities and the reasons for choosing such priorities. Groups recorded member comments on flip charts, which comments are shown on the attached Appendices B and
C. Individuals in each group then ranked the themes from 1 to 10 for each criterion. CDF aggregated group scores and computed weighted averages for each theme based on the criteria referenced.

Through this deliberation and prioritization process, residents chose Education as the Trust theme for 2013-14. Results for all themes are as follows:

Following the theme prioritization process, residents selected Trustees (and identified alternates if the named Trustees are not able to serve) who will host a series of Next Step Sessions (to occur on September 22, October 13, and November 10, 2013). Trustees must (a) be at least sixteen (16) years old, and (b) be residents of the 30021 zip code, or otherwise work, or own a business, in the zip code. At the Next Steps Sessions, residents and others interested in Education in Clarkston will be asked to share ideas and brainstorm potential educational initiatives to be funded by the Trust. Trustees will select up to five (5) such projects or initiatives based on the criteria of need, equity, and feasibility for submission to community residents at a later date. Residents will, then, have an opportunity to choose for Trust funding one of the projects proposed by the Trustees.

APPENDIX A

Definitions of Trust Themes and Criteria

Theme Definitions

Civic Engagement and Justice (e.g., voting rights, citizenship, etc.)

We want a community of registered voters supportive of initiatives and programs intended to provide opportunities for citizenship and voting to those who may not currently be entitled to vote or claim citizenship. We also want a community committed to equity and justice that provides forums and other opportunities to address injustice where found.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Voter Registration Drives
- Issues Forums
- Citizenship Education Programs

Connectedness

We want to be the model of an inclusive, peaceful community that sees its diverse cultures, arts, music, faiths, gifts, and abilities as the building blocks for further development. We want a community that has exceptional opportunities to gather, share, and celebrate.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Art and Music Festivals
- Cultural Festivals
- Community-Wide Celebrations and Gatherings

Economic Development

We want an economically vibrant community that has a mix of businesses (retail,

agricultural, industrial, and service/office) providing living-wage jobs for its residents.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Micro-Lending and other Entrepreneurship Programs
- Chamber of Commerce and Business Associations
- Jobs Forums and Fairs
- Business Incentive Programs
- Business Hubs

Education

We want to improve our schools and improve the quantity and quality of educational opportunities for those not yet in school and for those who are no longer eligible to attend public schools. We want to ensure that there is a range of educational opportunities to engage all age groups.

Examples include, but are not limited to

Early learning programs

- After School and School Age Programs
- Adult and Family Literacy
- Workforce and Vocational Technical Training

Food Security and Sustainability

We want a community where we have food markets with healthy choices and where we have access to community gardens and green corridors and open spaces.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Farmers Market
- Community Gardens
- Community-Supported Agriculture (CSAs)
- Food Co-Ops and Food Hubs

Health

We want a healthy community with access to local healthcare facilities and programs. We also want to address preventive health through health fairs and similar, or related, programs. We believe health includes mental/emotional health as well as physical health.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Affordable health facilities and providers, including mental health facilities and providers
- Health promoter programs
- Health resources, such as health guides, translator services, and on-line resources

Housing

We want a community that has sufficient, safe, quality, reasonably-priced housing available to all residents and potential residents.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Code Enforcement
- Tenant Forums and Landlord/Tenant Mediation
- Vacant/Abandoned Property Fund (for clean-up)
- Housing Forums

Play and Fitness

We want a community that has improved and more places for individuals and groups to exercise and to play. We want to find the right mix of facilities and programs in neighborhoods and apartment complexes, as well as facilities in public areas, for sports, recreation, and play.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Youth Recreation Programs
- Sports Leagues (all ages)

- Community Fitness Centers
- Bicycle Paths and Walking/Hiking Trails

Safety

We want to create a community that has clean and safe spaces, including passageways to those spaces. We also want communities organized to stand against crime and we want supportive and accountable relationships with our police officers in Clarkston and in DeKalb County.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Neighborhood Watch Programs
- Street and Park Clean-Up Programs
- Safe Sidewalks and Pedestrian Crosswalks
- Street Light Programs
- Recycling Programs

Transportation

We want a community that provides adequate access to public facilities, and provides transportation opportunities for its residents to locations within and outside of Clarkston.

Examples include, but are not limited to

- Ride Share Programs
- Community Car Rental Programs
- Bike Rentals and Repairs
- Local Public Transportation

Criteria Definitions

- A. **Need** Is there a need to address the particular theme in a way that it is not otherwise being addressed, or adequately addressed, in the community? Would addressing this theme provide the greatest positive impact for community well-being when compared to the other themes?
- B. **Equity** Would addressing the theme benefit the entire community in an inclusive way, with a preference for those who may be most in need? Work in which theme would be most beneficial to the entire community, with a preference for those who may be most in need?
- C. Local Involvement/Support Would you/family/neighbors/others support an initiative in this theme/area by contributing time, expertise/skills, money, or other resources? Would/could a project under this theme be generally supported by the community through investment of local resources such as time, money, expertise, labor, etc.?
