He is "ready" to go to Pre-K now," said one of the mothers at the first year anniversary celebration and open house for the Clarkston READY School, a free part day early learning and family engagement program located in the Clarkston Oaks Apartments and staffed by multi-lingual teachers from the Scottdale Early Learning, Inc.

The group identified and prioritized over 40 words that described Indian Creek Elementary School values, words like learning, do your best, quality, feliz (happy in Spanish) and Namaste (welcome in Nepali). The words became the trunk of the tree. Art teacher Zully Conde and her students helped paint the mural and added their own touches – flowers and bumble bees ---to the design.
